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Why outdoor play?

Early years outdoor play is more important than ever

Outdoor play has long been an important feature of early years education. The benefits to children's wellbeing and development are widely recognised. Early years lessons provide children with the confidence and awareness to explore the world around them. In a post-pandemic world, safe outdoor learning environments are especially important to children's wellbeing. Children may not have as many opportunities to get outside and outdoor play and physical exercise are needed to relieve stress and help kids feel happier.

The 10 Principles of Outdoor Play

- **1.** Indoors and outdoors should be viewed as one environment.
- **2.** Indoors and outdoors need to be accessible simultaneously to children.
- **3.** Outdoors should receive the same planning and resourcing as indoors.
- **4.** Outdoors is a teaching and learning environment.
- **5.** The layout and design of outdoor areas needs careful consideration.

- **6.** Outdoor play is central to early years learning.
- **7.** The outdoor classroom provides the opportunity to use effective modes of learning.
- **8.** Children need versatile environments and equipment.
- **9.** Children need the ability to modify and change their environment.
- **10.** Staff must support outdoor play.

- 1. Adult supervision and guidance
- 2. Secured perimeters and access to indoors
- 3. Toys and equipment in good condition
- 4. Shelter from adverse weather conditions
- 5. Free from obstructions and hazards
